Emotional Responses to Social Media and Non-Suicidal Self-Injury Among Adolescents

- Designed a two-part study to identify cross-sectional and longitudinal relationships between positive and negative emotional responses to social media and non-suicidal self-injury urges and engagement
- Conducted an extensive literature review regarding adolescent non-suicidal self-injury, social media use and mental health outcomes, and emotional responses to online and in-person experiences
- Used R to clean participant responses from an 8-week ecological momentary assessment study, conduct linear and logistic regressions, and conduct multilevel modeling with within-person centering

Disordered Eating, Self-Injurious Thoughts and Behaviors, and Appearance-Related Comments on Social Media

- Designed a cross-sectional study to identify whether appearance-related comments on social media played a significant role in the relationships between disordered eating, non-suicidal self-injury, and suicidal ideation
- Used R to filter participants from a larger dataset of responses, create participant scores for study measures, conduct logistic regression analyses with moderators, and create graphs and figures
